
About Lewisham's Ward profiles

The ward profiles bring together some of the key data sources to provide the demographic, social and economic characteristics of an area. In May 2022, the number of wards increased from 18 to 19.

- The boundaries of two wards have stayed the same, Telegraph Hill and Forest Hill, all the others changed.
- Two wards no longer exists: New Cross and Whitefoot.
- We now have three brand new wards: Deptford, Hither Green and New Cross Gate.
- 16 wards have three Councillors.
- Three wards have only two Councillors: Bellingham, Lewisham Central and New Cross Gate.
- The total number of Councillors remained in 54, the same as the previous period.

At the time of publication, the results of the 2021 Census have not yet been published, which means many indicator variables in this report rely on potentially outdated data from the 2011 Census. Data sources of all charts and statistics are clearly stated throughout this document. Revised data will be made available in the next revision of this document.

Bellingham

Bellingham is a ward with large housing estates which do not have many community spaces within them —meaning a lot of activity is "centralised" around Bellingham Green and the High Street. This can be a challenge for organising community activities in varies area within the ward, however there are also opportunities to find ways to create more "place based" community development within the area.


There is a **strong community spirit and the primary schools act as key local hubs for a sense of community** –shown for example in their participation in Bellingham Festival. The schools geographical location nestled within estates mean they play a key part in community life.

Bellingham is one of the four most deprived wards in Lewisham and is among the top 10% most deprived wards in England. Fly tipping tends to be a particular problem in Bellingham.

Networks and groups in the ward include; Bellingham Community Project, Bellingham Youth Forum, Fellowship and Star pub, Wildcat Wilderness. Key community events include; Bellingham Festival and Carols on the Green.

In Bellingham ward £86,040 was awarded in NCIL funding to eight projects (within the old ward boundaries). Ward priorities included; Transport and streets, Air quality, Community safety, Open/green spaces and nature, Community facilities and Youth provision. Some of the NCIL projects include; community engagement events, workshops and holiday clubs for children and young people, and community garden projects.

Population

Bellingham has an estimated population of **11,682 residents**, which makes it one of the smaller constituencies in the borough (rank 17 of 19 wards.)

Among its residents, **51.5% identify as female**, and **48.5% as male**. Unfortunately, ONS population statistics do not include estimates for nonbinary gender identities.

The **average age in Bellingham is 35**, compared to 36 in Lewisham as a whole, and 37 in London.


In terms of its geographic area, at 2.4 km² it is one of the largest wards in the borough (rank 2 of 19.)





Diversity: Ethnicity and religion

Ethnicity

40.4% of Bellingham residents have an ethnicity of White British (White English, Welsh, Scottish, or Northern Irish), compared to 41.5% in Lewisham as a whole, 44.9% in London, and 79.8% in England.

Among those not White British, the three most common ethnicities are Black African (14.5%), Black Caribbean (13.3%), and White Other (6.5%).






Religion

57.0% of Bellingham residents identify as Christian, compared to 52.8% in Lewisham as a whole, 48.4% in London, and 59.4% in England. Among those not identifying as Christian, the three most common religions are No Religion (23.2%), Not Stated (9.2%), and Muslim (6.5%).

Religion and beliefs in Bellingham, ONS Census 2011






Diversity: Country of birth


69.7% of Bellingham residents were born in England, compared to 64.0% in Lewisham as a whole, 61.1% in London, and 83.5% in England.

Among those not born in England, the three most common countries of birth are Jamaica (4.3%), Nigeria (3.9%), and Sri Lanka (1.7%).




Diversity: Languages


87.1% of Bellingham residents speak English as their primary language, compared to 83.5% in Lewisham as a whole, 77.9% in London, and 92.0% in England.

Of the remaining residents, 10.5% can speak English well or very well.






Population speaking little or no English in Bellingham, ONS Census 2011



On the other hand, 2.4% of residents cannot speak English well or at all, compared to a Lewisham average of 3.1%. This means an estimated 278 people in Bellingham may require everyday language support.

Among those not speaking English as their main language, the three most widely spoken languages are Tamil (2.0%), French (1.3%), and Turkish (1.0%).

Main language (excluding English) in Bellingham, ONS Census 2011






Deprivation

The Index of Multiple Deprivation (IMD) is the official measure of relative deprivation in England. It is based on multiple factors: population income, employment, education skills and training, health and disability, crime, barriers to housing and services, and general living environment.


The IMD is determined for small areas, using a statistical geography called Lower-layer Super Output Areas (LSOA), with each LSOA typically representing between 1,000 and 3,000 people. Each LSOA in England is ranked from most deprived to least deprived, and then segmented into ten groups (or deciles), with the bottom decile (or decile 1) representing the most deprived 10% LSOAs in England.

Of the six LSOAs in Bellingham, all six rank in the bottom 20% of the country (decile 1 or 2.)

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Fuel poverty and EPC

Fuel poverty in England is measured statistically using the Low Income High Costs definition, under which a household is considered to be in fuel poverty if:

- They have required fuel costs that above average (the national median spend on fuel).
- Were they to spend that amount they would be left with a residual income below the official poverty line.


In the six LSOAs in Bellingham, proportion of households fuel poor ranges from 15.8% to 26.8%.

Energy Performance Certificates (EPCs) were first introduced in England and Wales in 2007, and are valid for 10 years. They contain information about a property's energy use and typical energy costs, and recommendations about how to reduce energy use and save money. Dwellings are rated between A (highly energy efficient) and G (highly inefficient.) The average EPC rating for dwellings in England is D.

In Bellingham, 50% of assessed households have received an EPC rating of A, B, or C, which means they are highly energy-efficient.

It is estimated that the share of highly energy-efficient dwellings in Bellingham could be as high as 87% if home owners were to carry out the improvements recommended during their assessment.




Housing and affordability


47.9% of Bellingham residents live in flats, compared to 55.4% in Lewisham as a whole, 52.2% in London, and 22.1% in England. Among Bellingham residents, the three most common accommodation types are Flats (47.9%), Terraced (28.9%), and Semi-detached houses (20.4%).

52.3% of Bellingham residents live in social rented accommodation, compared to 31.1% in Lewisham as a whole, 24.1% in London, and 17.7% in England. Among Bellingham residents, the three most common types of tenure are Social rented (52.3%), Owned (33.7%), and Private rented (12.2%).

House prices in Lewisham remain lower than those for London as a whole. In 2020, the median house price in the borough was £430,000 compared with £483,000 for Greater London and £249,000 for England.

In terms of relative affordability based on median prices, Lewisham had a median work-place based income to house price ratio in 2020 of 12.3x. Based on median ratios, Lewisham was relatively more affordable than Lambeth, Greenwich and Bromley; and less affordable than Southwark, Croydon, Tower Hamlets and London overall, the South East region and England.

Relative affordability of median prices by local authority area, ONS 2021



Of Bellingham's households in 2011, 34.1% were one person households, 54.7% were families and 11% other household types, compared to a Lewisham average composition of 34.1% one person household, 51.3% families and 14.4% other household types.




Employment


1n the 2011 Census, the unemployment rate in Bellingham was 7.8% among residents aged 16-74, compared to a Lewisham average of 6.3%.

31.6% of residents are not economically active, for example because they are in education, looking after home or family, long-term sick or disabled, or in retirement.

The three most common occupations in Bellingham are Caring, leisure and other service occupations (14.4%), Elementary occupations (14.1%), and Professional occupations (13.2%).


Benefit claimants

Universal Credit is the primary social security payment for working-age people with a low household income. It was introduced in 2013 and has gradually replaced six prior benefits: income-based Employment and Support Allowance, income-based Jobseeker's Allowance, and Income Support; Child Tax Credit and Working Tax Credit; and Housing Benefit.


All Universal Credit recipients receive a standard payment that varies by age and whether they live with a partner. Additional payments are offered to help with housing, children and childcare, sickness and disability, and for carers. A further weekly £20 uplift was offered during the COVID-19 pandemic until September 2021.


Health and wellbeing

Census captures different metrics related to a self-assessment of health which can be a useful indicator of the population's general wellbeing and health-related quality of life. These include general health, day-to-day activities limited, and provision of unpaid care.


The average rate of Bellingham residents in very good/good health is 79% compared to a Lewisham average of 81% and a national average of 83%.

Around 9% residents of Bellingham had a long term health problem or disability limiting their day to day activities a lot compared to a Lewisham average of 7% and a national average of 8.3%.

Day-to-day activities limited in Bellingham, ONS Census 2011








Around 9.2% of residents in Bellingham provided unpaid care compared to a Lewisham average of 8.1% and a national average of 10.1%.




The average life expectancy at birth for females in Bellingham is 83.6 years compared to England average of 83.2.


Environment

Air quality

The DEFRA 2010 Air Quality Objective sets a target threshold for Nitrogen Dioxide particles in the air at **no more than 40 micrograms**

per cubic metre of air.

This model from 2019 estimates levels based on historical readings at sensor sites, interpolated across the whole of Greater London.




Air quality in Bellingham, London Atmospheric

Car/van availability in Bellingham, ONS Census 2011






Education

Educational attainment

There are nine qualification levels in England: Entry level and then levels 1-9. Levels 1-2 cover GCSE and equivalents, Level 3 covers A level and equivalents, and Levels 4-8 cover higher education equivalents.

In Bellingham, 27% of residents have no qualifications; 16% have Level 1 qualifications; 15% have Level 2 qualifications; 2% have Apprenticeship; 10% have Level 3 qualifications; and 21% have Level 4 qualifications and above.

OFSTED Ratings

This section provides general information on schools located in the ward and their OFSTED ratings.

Ofsted is the Office for Standards in Education, Children's Services and Skills. They inspect services providing education and skills for learners of all ages. They also inspect and regulate services that care for children and young people.

Out of seven schools in Bellingham, one is rated as Outstanding, four are rated as Good, and one is rated as Requires improvement.




Crime


In the period January-December 2021, the number of recorded crimes in Lewisham was 25692 (excluding sexual offences).

Of 980 recorded crimes (Home Office crime classifications, excluding sexual offences) in Bellingham, the three most common offences include violence against the person (416), vehicle offences (123) and theft (111).

In the six LSOAs in Bellingham, overall crime rates per 1,000 people range from 61.6 to 111.6.


Residents Survey

Due to limited data from Lewisham Residents' Survey 2021 at ward level, survey results included in this document are presented at the borough level.

Satisfaction with the Council

Over two thirds (69%) of residents are satisfied with the way Lewisham Council runs things, whilst around 11% are dissatisfied. Satisfaction in Lewisham is significantly higher when compared with LGA October 2021 National data (56%; 13 percentage points).


Satisfaction with how Lewisham Council runs things, Lewisham Residents' Survey 2021
